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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

AGORA Young Feminist Summer School is one of the European Women's Lobby (EWL) flagship programmes that brings together young feminists from all over Europe to discuss and explore feminism and learn from each other. The programme is open to young women aged between 18 and 30 (at the time of the AGORA) who are keen to connect with other young feminists.

The 2024 AGORA took place from 9-13 September 2024 in Brussels at the Amazone multi-purpose centre. 40 women from all over Europe participated in an intensive five-day event strengthening their capacities as feminist change makers. The programme evolved through presentations, discussions, and participant-led workshops touching on various topics from feminist foreign policy to digital feminism, women in STEM and menstrual health. A study visit to the EU institutions based in Brussels was organized. The Summer School concluded with a discussion on AGORA Alumni Network and feedback from the participants with the view to their take on the event and suggestions for future AGORAs.

The event was an unequivocal success, epitomising the true essence of collegial spirit among participants from a myriad of backgrounds and various parts of the world. It was profoundly inspiring to witness such a diverse group of women come together, united by a shared purpose and vision.

Throughout the event, the atmosphere was charged with enthusiasm and a genuine desire to connect and collaborate. Participants engaged in meaningful discussions, shared their stories, and supported one another, creating a vibrant and inclusive community. This convergence of minds and hearts laid a robust foundation for future networks and collaborations.

The connections made and the camaraderie shared during this event will undoubtedly pave the way for lasting partnerships and continued support among these remarkable women. 2. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY



AGORA, hosted by the European Women's Lobby (EWL), is an enriching five-day program designed to bring together young feminists from various corners of Europe. The event serves as a vibrant platform for young women aged 18 to 30 who are passionate about feminism, gender equality and women's rights. Through a participatory summer camp format, AGORA aims to foster connections, inspire and empower. It offers a unique space for skill-building, knowledge exchange and the exploration of feminist strategies and campaigns. The event is inclusive, embracing diversity and encouraging the participation of women from marginalised groups and from different geographical areas. The participants are eager to connect with like-minded feminists, enhance advocacy skills and actively contribute to advancing women's rights.

This Report invites you to embark on a vibrant journey into the essence of EWL AGORA 2023. It's a window into the lively tapestry of our event, offering you a first-hand experience of its diverse and dynamic elements. From engaging sessions to insightful discussions, AGORA 2023 was a celebration of knowledge, collaboration, and progress. Let this report be your guide, painting a vivid picture of the energy and enthusiasm that defined our time together.

3. OBJECTIVES

3.1 Organisational level

This section serves as a foundational compass, setting the stage for a thorough exploration of the proceedings. It encapsulates the event's core objectives, providing a clear roadmap for the reader.

The 5-day participatory summer camp aimed to create a space for young women to exchange, bridge gaps, inspire and be inspired, strengthen connections, reinforce skills and hear the voices of other young feminists. The main objective is to empower young women feminists in Europe to be activist leaders in a changing world by giving them a space to share experiences, knowledge and ideas and a network to become changemakers in their communities.

More concretely EWL aimed at:

- Revitalising and strengthening the engagement of young European women in activism.
- Uniting diverse young feminists to exchange insights, fostering connections, and sharing experiences.
- Establishing an innovative platform for budding feminist changemakers to cultivate their activism.
- Fostering unity, emboldening emerging feminist leaders to collaborate internationally to enhance the inclusivity of feminism and magnify the influence of European feminist networks.
- Delving into the dimensions of feminist leadership and influence.
- Enhancing the EWL's comprehension of the preferences, requirements, and undertakings of the youth.

3.2. Thematic level

The 2024 AGORA centred around several topics. First, participants were introduced to the EWL Policy Priorities and Beijing Platform for Action, followed by sessions focusing on topics such as Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) and women's reproductive and health rights using the ongoing EU campaign My Voice, My Choice as a case study. Last but not least, EWL staff and AGORA participants also addressed the issue of cyberviolence against women with a special focus on the EWL campaign HER NET HER RIGHTS.

Breakdown of key objectives:

- **Attainment of Profound Expertise:** Empower participants to acquire comprehensive knowledge and insights concerning topics encompassing Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG), gender equality women's rights both within Europe and across the global landscape and cyberviolence against women.
- **Resource Building:** Gather valuable tools and materials that empower young feminists to navigate challenges effectively.
- **Skills Reinforcement:** Strengthen existing skills and develop new ones, enabling young feminists to make a more substantial impact.
- **Safe Space Creation:** Cultivate an environment where young feminists can freely express themselves, fostering openness and trust.
- **Knowledge Building:** Acquire insights and information that enhance understanding of feminist issues and strategies.

- **Networking:** Connect with a diverse array of fellow young feminists, expanding collaborative opportunities.
- **Exchanging:** Share experiences, ideas, and perspectives to create a rich tapestry of insights and learnings.
- **Empowering:** Foster a sense of confidence and agency among young feminists, empowering them to drive change.
- **Encouraging Activism and Engagement:** Motivate young feminists to take action and play an active role in advocacy and initiatives.

4. PROGRAMME HIGHLIGHTS

The programme was crafted to engage 40 participants, allowing them the opportunity to collaboratively establish a secure and conducive learning environment. Participants were able to enlarge their expertise and insights into the European discourse on women's rights, violence against women and girls and cyberspace violence against women. Additionally, the set-up provided a safe space for open discussions on pertinent subjects, enabling the formulation of impactful recommendations. The highlights were the meeting with the members of the EWL Executive Committee who shared their personal experiences as feminists and the workshops delivered by the participants. A series of workshops focused on key issues related to women's rights, intersectionality, and social justice. Participants engaged in interactive discussions, shared personal experiences, and explored systemic barriers affecting women in various contexts. The detailed agenda is added in Annex 1.

In this section, we comprehensively explore the event, offering insights into the strategic framework that underpins the programme's thematic structure. Here, we introduce the daily titles and core session objectives, providing a clear roadmap for the unfolding proceedings. Moreover, we present a condensed summary of the event's key activities, with a special focus on sessions that left a lasting impact. By highlighting particularly engaging and influential segments, we aim to showcase the richness and significance of the event's content.

Daily check-in and check-out

Each day started and ended with a collective check-in and check-out.

- **Check-in to Harvest the Needs and Connecting to Purpose:** At the beginning of each day, participants engaged in check-in to foster connection and self-awareness, sharing their current thoughts and feelings. This practice helped set the tone and purpose for the upcoming discussions.
- **Check-out to Reflect and Be Mindful:** Similarly, at the end of each day, a check-out activity encouraged participants to reflect on their learning, experiences, and takeaways. This mindful reflection provided closure and a sense of direction as participants left the session.

WELCOME AND COLLABORATION PRINCIPLES

Day 1 began with an interactive session facilitated by Dr Samaneh Shabani and Dr Alenka Verbole. The session aimed to foster connections among participants and establish a sense of camaraderie. Approximately 20 participants arrived on time for Day 1 and discovered through various exercises that they had much in common. They discussed what they are proud of and what they would like to change in their countries regarding women's rights and gender equality.

Many participants expressed pride in the level of gender equality achieved in their countries. They felt proud to identify as feminists and were satisfied with being able to do so. They also appreciated women's movements and recognised the right to abortion and legislative frameworks promoting gender equality as positive achievements. They acknowledged that small steps can lead to significant changes.

On the more negative side, participants identified several issues: the strong presence of misogyny, violence against women and girls, domestic violence and femicide, limitations imposed on women and girls by religion, the increasing backlash against women's rights, re-emerging gender stereotypes, purplewashing and pinkwashing, issues of access rights, personal safety, misinterpretation of feminism, and women being reluctant or afraid to be labelled as feminists. They also noted the need to review legal frameworks to further the social, economic, and political empowerment of women,

and the attitudes of some state institutions towards women and the LGBTQ+ community.

The participants also noted that there are countries where women have no rights. The interactive discussions confirmed the relevance of the core topics and allowed for an assessment of the young women's needs. This process also helped shape the content of the event to align with the participants' interests and concerns.

Caitlin Raph, EWL Membership Officer, presented an overview of the week's itinerary, outlining the scheduled activities, workshops, and discussions, providing participants with an understanding of what to expect during the event.

In the spirit of empowerment and inclusivity, a session titled "Creating Safe Space" provided an open forum for participants to explore and discuss the vital elements that contribute to nurturing a safe and inclusive environment during the training. Elements such as mutual respect, active listening, open-mindedness, refraining from judgement and criticism, and timeliness were listed. These elements formed the basis for interaction during the week, allowing all participants to engage equally in discussions and freely express their opinions.

A Meta-plan exercise was used to identify participants' individual expectations and objectives for the week, as well as their fears. Among their expectations, participants listed the need for a safe space, enjoyment in building connections with fellow feminists, learning from each other and

understanding different contexts, expanding theoretical knowledge, learning about the EU's views and legislation on gender-based violence, and improving communication.

Regarding their fears, participants mentioned concerns about time management, the fear that small steps might not be enough to change society and the planet, the fear of being misunderstood, polarisation of opinions, other participants being patronising or dismissive, missing important contextual knowledge when discussing topics, not being able to apply theoretical knowledge in practice, not getting to know everyone, systemic hatred towards LGBTQ+ people, and not feeling competent enough to engage in discussions. This exercise facilitated a mutual understanding of the collective goals and provided a basis for the evaluation of the training on Day 5.

DAY 2

POLICY DEBATE

Day 2 was dedicated to policy debate. Following the check-in, where it was necessary to revisit the outcomes of Day 1 as only half of the group attended the first session, the EWL President, Iliana Balabanova, gave an overview of the EWL, its mission, values, priorities, and the importance of engaging with young women. The EWL Executive Committee shared their experiences as feminists and their paths towards activism. The 1995 Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action were presented, highlighting its significance to the global agenda for gender equality. Thirty years later, the message “women’s rights are human rights, and human rights are women’s rights” remains ever so relevant. The strongest message was the importance of building alliances to achieve an equal society and an equal future for all.

Irene Rosales, EWL Senior Policy Advisor, introduced the topic of violence against women and girls (VAWG) in Europe. The session aimed to illustrate the overall situation and explore actions at the EU level to combat VAWG. Special focus was placed on tools like the Istanbul Convention and the Directive on combating violence against women and domestic violence.

Following this, Alexia Fafara, EWL Policy and Campaigns Officer, presented a European citizen initiative to allow access to abortion for all women in Europe, titled “My Voice, My Choice.” She introduced the EWL’s position on access to abortion, advocating for its inclusion in the EU Charter for Fundamental Rights.



DAY 3

EMPOWERMENT THROUGH PARTICIPANT-LED WORKSHOPS

Day 3 started with Check in exercise looking at the key outcomes of Day 2 and introducing participants to Day 3. A series of workshops marked Day 3 focusing on key issues related to women's rights, intersectionality, and social justice. Participants engaged in interactive discussions, shared personal experiences, and explored systemic barriers affecting women in various contexts. During the day, 12 workshops have been held in total. In order to maximise the interactive discussion among the participants, the workshops were organised in three parallel sessions.

Day 3 provided participants with a platform to discuss critical issues, share experiences, and explore solutions for advancing women's rights and promoting intersectional feminism.

Various topics were discussed, namely:

- Tackling Sexism in the Media;
- Menstrual Health and Hygiene Rights;
- Deconstructing Digital Platforms: Analysing OnlyFans' Implications for Feminist Theory;
- Digital Activism and Feminism;
- The Legal Definition of Rape Across the EU: an affirmative consent approach;
- Restrictive abortion policies across Europe and future possible scenarios;
- Women in STEM;
- Roma Feminism in the EU;
- Gendering Technology;
- Schools Against Slut Shaming;
- Feminist Foreign Policy and Disarmament;
- Why do We Need Feminist Foreign Policy?



EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT DAY

Participants had the opportunity to visit several key EU institutions, which provided them with a comprehensive understanding of the European Union's workings and its historical context. The day began with an enlightening tour of the Parliamentarium, where participants gained an exhaustive explanation of the role of the European Parliament and its challenges.

Following the museum visit, participants enjoyed a delightful lunch at the European Parliament Canteen. This setting not only offered a chance to relax and network but also provided a unique atmosphere to discuss the insights gained from the morning's activities. The lunch break served as a perfect interlude before the next part of their visit.

In the afternoon, participants were given an exclusive tour of the House of European History, where participants delved into the origins, history, and significant achievements of the EU. This immersive experience allowed them to gain a deeper appreciation of the EU's evolution and its impact on Europe and the world.

Overall, the visit to the EU institutions was an eye-opening experience that left participants with a profound understanding of the European Union's mission, its achievements, and the ongoing efforts to promote unity and cooperation among member states.



REFLECTION AND LOOK INTO THE FUTURE

Day 5 revolved around reflections and looked into the future. One of the key topics discussed was the Alumni network. Dr Alenka Verbole presented the contributions of the participants of the previous AGORA events, their experiences and recommendations. Participants then engaged in a dynamic brainstorming and discussion focused on the Alumni Network's objectives, structure, priorities and strategies as regards young women's engagement. Many innovative ideas for the development and growth of the network were put forward.

The participants agreed that the main purpose of the Alumni network would be to keep in touch, share resources, build partnerships and alliances, share knowledge and best practices, create joint projects and networks. They proposed to the EWL to engage with the alumni and create a social media platform or LinkedIn or Instagram page and create a full-time and full-paid position of an Alumni Coordinator to formalise the Network. They also recommended organising workshops on various topics relevant to feminism regularly. They proposed that EWL consider fundraising for the Network and mentorship schemes, creation of a "pool of experts", and consider monthly newsletter/reports to be shared with alumni.

The session on the Alumni network was followed by the evaluation session which commenced with a reflection on the expectations and fears expressed on Day 1, completing the week spent together.

Participants enjoyed meeting each other as the event brought together an amazing group of young women with diverse backgrounds, experiences and expertise, but similar interests, objectives and concerns. They felt connected. They made new friends and built bridges. They appreciated the positive and collegial atmosphere, open communication and the interactive approach to training. They in particular loved the participants-led workshops, and with that wished that there was more time for in-depth discussions. They also suggested that this part of the programme be expanded and that a selection of themes and the delivery be strengthened as some of the presentations only touched the basics.

In the framework of the certificate awarding ceremony, each participant was encouraged to step forward and share one or two takeaways from their five-day AGORA journey, as they received their certificates and passed them on to their peers. This concluding evaluation and farewell were marked by heartfelt expressions of gratitude.

The meeting was closed by the EWL Secretary General Mary Collins. She underlined that young women need a voice and to speak for themselves.

5. KEY TAKEAWAYS AND RESULTS

The 2024 AGORA was an overall success with 40 young women from across Europe learning from each other, sharing experiences and practices while also engaging with new topics and learning more about the work of the EWL.

On Day 1, the 2024 AGORA participants collectively discussed and agreed on a set of objectives for the week, which are summarised below:

- Reconnect and reinforce young European women's activism;
- Bring together young feminists from different backgrounds and with different experiences, to learn from each other and create connections;
- Set up a creative space for young feminist change agents to develop their activism;
- Build solidarity, empower young feminist activists and work together across borders to make feminism more inclusive and amplify the voices of feminist networks in Europe;
- Explore the concept of feminist leadership and power;
- Enable the EWL to better understand the interests, needs and activities of young feminists in Europe and bring these more into the centre of EWL's future strategy and actions.

AGORA indeed provided a unique space to discuss issues of common interest, learn from each other, forge networks and build alliances with other feminists across Europe. The strength of the group lied in the rich diversity between different nationalities, backgrounds, ages, lived experiences and knowledge within the group.

By setting up a safe space framework on the first day, the participants exchanged perspectives, discuss and learn from each other. The participants forged new friendships, and connections and expressed that they now have a network of other feminist activists across Europe from which they can draw upon in the future in continuing to advocate for women's rights.

A major takeaway from the week was the peer-to-peer learning sessions, where participants led workshops and were inspired by real examples of activism. The 2024 AGORA also provided a platform for young women to offer strong recommendations on topics that matter most to them. These recommendations will be shared with the EWL and its network to better understand the participants' interests, needs, and activities, and to incorporate them into EWL's future work.



6. CHALLENGES AND LESSONS LEARNT

The 2024 AGORA successfully brought together 40 young women from diverse backgrounds, experiences, and levels of knowledge about feminism. It created a safe space for them to discuss and debate numerous issues of concern, exchange ideas, and share challenges. However, the programme was very complex, and the time allocated to different topics did not allow for in-depth discussions.



It would be worthwhile to consider expanding the programme to two weeks and restructuring it accordingly. Presentations on different topics could be spread out over the week(s), and the participant-led workshops could be extended to allow more time for group discussions. Additionally, organising a concluding session after the participant-led workshops, where presenters could reflect on the questions and discussions in a plenary session, would be beneficial.

On several occasions, the AGORA agenda was too tightly packed, not allowing sufficient time for debate and discussions among participants and with the various presenters. Overall, participants felt that the duration of AGORA was too short. They appreciated the excellent organisation of the event and Amazone's philosophy but felt that the training space should be more spacious with better lighting and wished for more options on the menu. They also expressed a desire for more sessions on topics such as the EU and gender-based violence, abolitionism, surrogacy, intersectionality, prostitution, and pornography in a moderated and de-escalation-centred setting to ensure the smooth discussion of potentially contentious topics.

Additionally, participants had anticipated discussing the EU's policy priorities with the MEPs during their visit to the European Parliament, but the MEPs were unavailable due to the European elections.

In the future, it might also be worth considering either limiting the number of participants to a maximum of 25 or changing the facilities to provide better working conditions. Furthermore, it would be helpful to agree during the planning stage of the next event on which theoretical concepts should be explored, given the varying levels of knowledge among participants, to ensure everyone benefits optimally from the training. Finally, the EWL or the experts/trainers should ensure that there are clear linkages between the theoretical concepts and the practical experiences of participants.

7. NEXT STEPS

The event was not only a celebration of collegial spirit but also a fertile ground for the exchange of innovative ideas aimed at promoting gender equality in societies where women have limited rights. Participants from various backgrounds and regions shared their insights and strategies, fostering a rich dialogue on how to advance gender equality globally.

One of the most compelling aspects of the event was the contribution from three Afghan participants. They shared some of the innovative ideas they plan to implement in their communities, which are often challenging environments for women's rights. Their ideas were met with great enthusiasm and support from the other participants, highlighting the collective commitment to making a difference.

In addition to the Afghan contributions, many other participants shared their perspectives on addressing feminism and gender equality issues within different cultural contexts. This exchange of ideas was invaluable, as it provided a broader understanding of the challenges and opportunities in various regions. Participants discussed strategies such as leveraging local traditions and values to promote gender equality, creating inclusive educational programmes, and using social media to amplify women's voices.

The diversity of thought and experience present at the event underscored the importance of a multifaceted approach to gender equality. By sharing their unique insights and strategies, participants were able to learn from each other and develop a more comprehensive understanding of how to tackle these issues. This collaborative spirit will undoubtedly lead to more effective and sustainable solutions.

Moreover, the event facilitated the formation of new alliances and partnerships. Participants left with a renewed sense of purpose and a network of like-minded individuals committed to advancing gender equality. These connections will be instrumental in driving future initiatives and ensuring that the ideas shared at the event are brought to fruition.

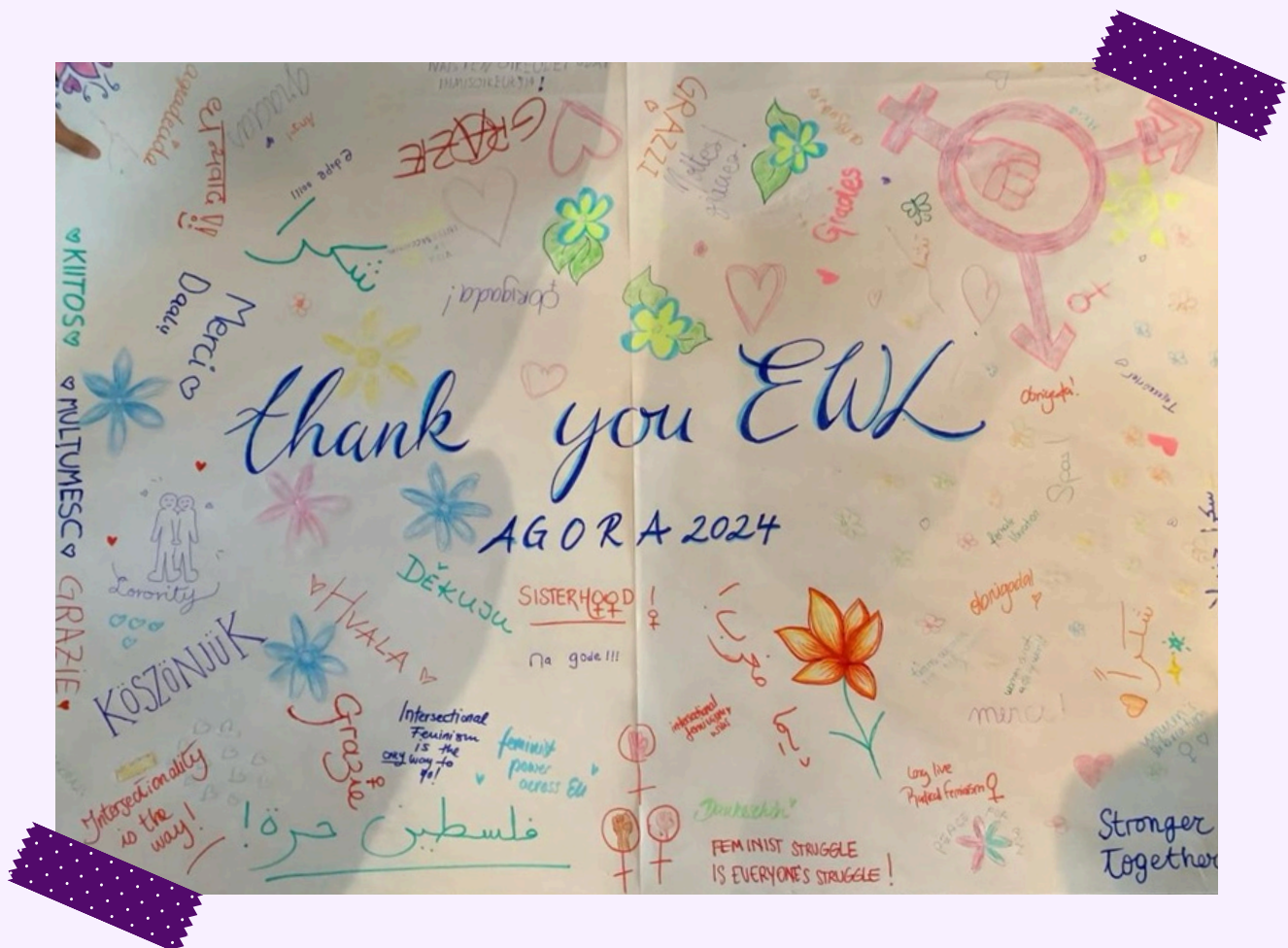

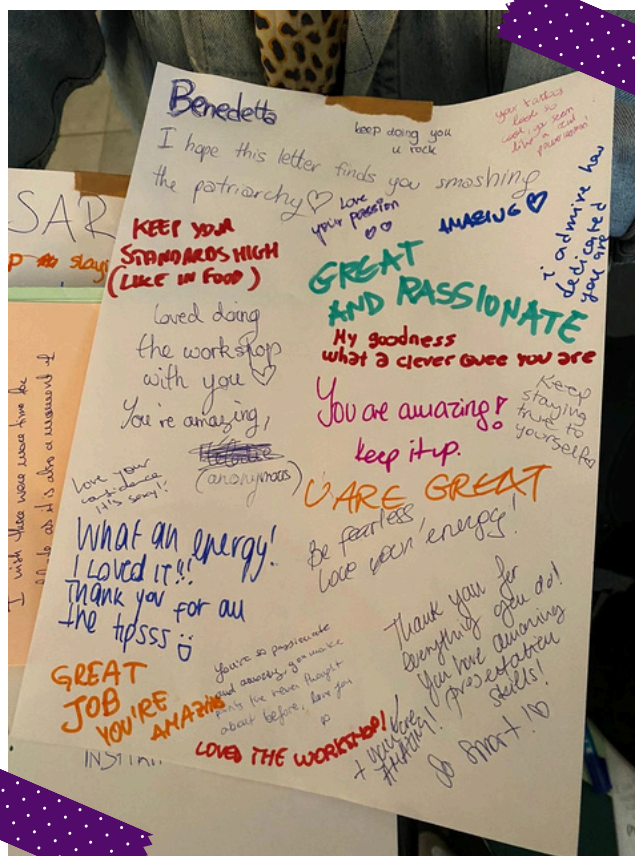
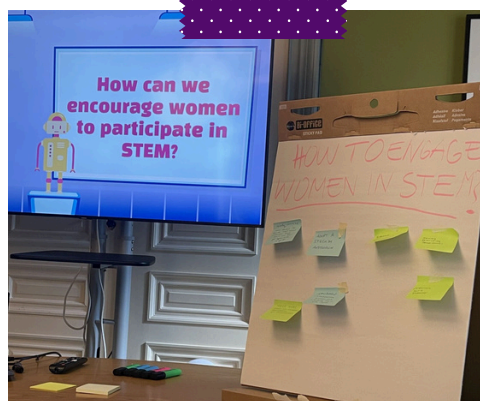
